“Jacob pitched his tent” (Genesis 33:18)

So, like Jacob in the Old Testament, I have pitched my tent in a new place. I am not, of course, living in a tent, but a house. The house is in West Sussex, not very far from Gatwick Airport – a place of comings and goings. As scouts, we are used to pitching tents. It is part of our experience and we enjoy the opportunities to explore new places, meet new people and learn new things. A tent reminds us that life is about moving on – and life is all about moving on, for we are a pilgrim people, called to follow Christ where he leads us. For me, this has meant responding to the call to leave the Bishopric of the Forces for a new Diocese. I have spent the last two months or so getting to know new places and meeting new people. The Lord has called me to journey with them on their pilgrim way and, in walking with others, I also make my own journey. May our journey as scouts be an experience of always listening to what Christ wants us to do – a way of life on which we are always prepared to follow Him as our guide.

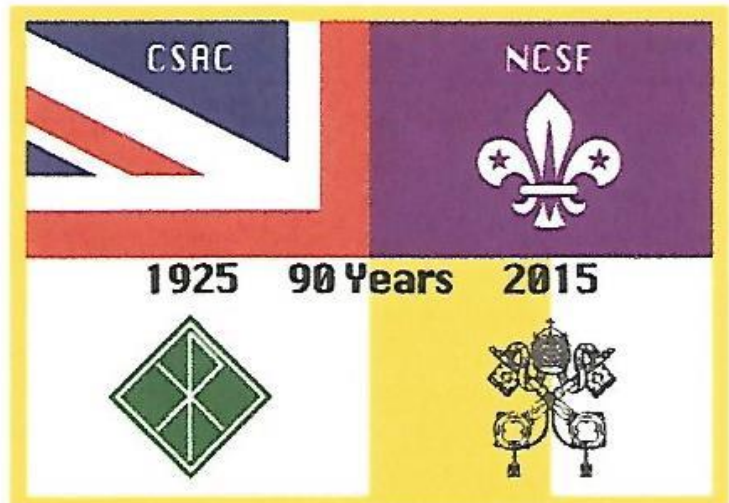

Rome Revisited

The Ninetieth Anniversary Pilgrimage of the ICS 1925 Pilgrimage to Rome

In 1925 over 10,000 scouts from Europe, Australia, Newfoundland, Malta, the Middle East, the USA England and Ireland travelled to Rome on a Catholic Scout pilgrimage. The United Kingdom and Irish contingent numbered 750. Unfortunately a Scout named Egan died as a result of an accident whilst on the pilgrimage. These facts are taken from a book that was published in 1925 and the only copy known is held in the NCSF archives. On the contingent's return to the UK it was decided to form The Catholic Scout Advisory Council (CSAC) which later became the National Catholic Scout Fellowship (NCSF).

In its heyday the CSAC was very active with many Catholic Scout groups and regional Catholic Scout guilds operating all over the UK. Over the years Catholic Scouting has declined. The NCSF, now a Scout Active Support Unit, is still very active at a national level and is the voice of Catholic Scouting promoting the Catholic faith as part of the UK Scout Association promise and training programme.



In 2015 the NCSF organised another pilgrimage to Rome in celebration of the 90th anniversary of that first pilgrimage. The 2015 pilgrimage was open to scouts and above, but only 15 adult scouts signed up for the journey including our international visitor, Michelle from Hong Kong.

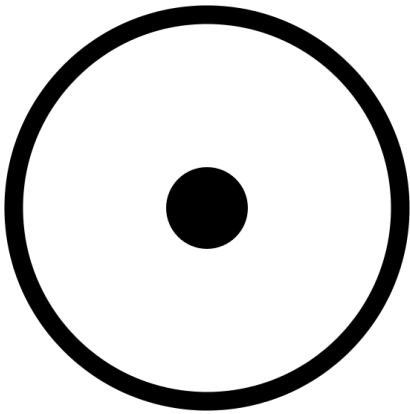
Our base was a 13th century monastery, Villa Palazolla, owned by the English College (the seminary in Rome). Situated on a hill some 18 south of Rome it overlooks Lake Albano (a dormant volcano) and the Pope's summer palace in Castel Gandolfo on the opposite shore. The food and wine, although basic, was plentiful and excellent!

We visited a number of prominent religious sites including the church of Saint George (the Scout church) with the highlight of our pilgrimage being the Vatican basilica and the Pope's general audience where the NCSF was announced to the massive audience. The other outstanding highlight was a visit for afternoon tea to the British Ambassador to the Holy See, His Excellency Nigel Baker OBE, whose top floor apartment overlooked Rome. The views, as well as the tea and cakes, were out of this world! Ann Ingleby (NCSF badge secretary) continued her hobby of have having photograph taken with celebrities, the ambassador being her latest 'catch'. But how does this compare to the photo taken with Bear in 2014?

Father Brian Lamb, the National Catholic Scout Chaplain for Scotland, was our chaplain, who stepped in at short notice after the sad death of Father John Seddon, the instigator of the pilgrimage. We thank Father Brian for his input and his companionship. Margaret McDowall brought a framed photo of Father John on pilgrimage and he travelled everywhere with us. God bless him and may he rest in peace, amen.

Finally a big thank you to Anthony Coles Travel, who under great pressure organised our trip. Our guide made our special pilgrimage so memorable and to the staff of Villa Palazolla who made our stay so enjoyable, so much so that some of us want to return. www.palazolla.it





Tony Curtis RIP

Tony was a member of the 3rd Wallington (Methodist) Scout Group as both a Cub and Scout, becoming a King's Scout at the age of 17 in 1949. In 1951 he helped found the 11th Wallington (Saint Elphege's) Scout Group, becoming the Scoutmaster, and later Group Scoutmaster from 1957-63.

At that time Tony's energy and enthusiasm were unbounded: he was Assistant Scoutmaster with the 25th Lewisham South (Saint Augustine's) Group (1950-52), Assistant Scoutmaster with the 6th Sidcup (Saint Lawrence) Group (1955-57) and Cubmaster with the 25th Croydon (Saint Joseph's College) (1957-58).

For a few months in 1963 Tony became District Scoutmaster in Wallington & Carshalton District, and he was Assistant County Commissioner in Greater London South West from 1968 until 1984. During this time he was awarded the Medal of Merit for his services. In 1977 after a brief spell as Assistant District Commissioner he became District Commissioner for Wallington & Carshalton District until 1982. In 1984 Tony was made an Honorary Scouter. He held various appointments at County and HQ, where he worked for a few years about 1960, and with the then Catholic Scout Advisory Council. He regularly attended both Group events and the annual Founder's Day Mass at Saint George's Cathedral, Southwark, and was there earlier this year.

A Memorial Mass and Celebration of Tony's life will be held at 2 pm on Saturday 5th September at Worth Abbey, Sussex (Tony's Parish), followed by a reception. Numbers attending should be notified to Tony's brother at: chriscurtis@aol.com

From Margaret McDowall

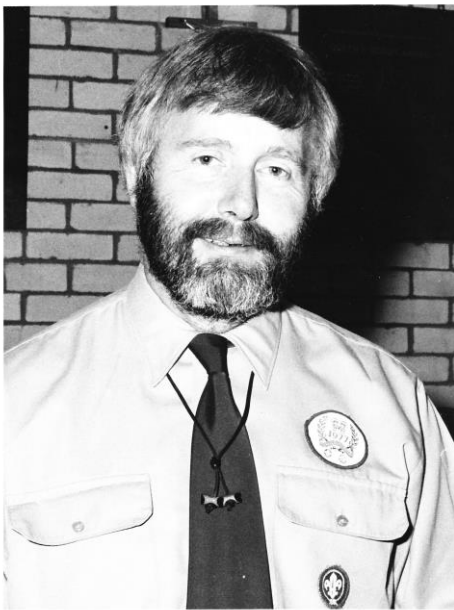
I knew Tony for as long as I have been a member of the CSAC and NCSF. Tony was a highly intelligent man and his knowledge of Scouting was sound. His faith was very important to him and he always led by example. He always supported CSAC and latterly the NCSF by attending the various events that were organised. His last appearance was at the annual Founder's Day Mass at St George's Cathedral, Southwark.

We had a very large executive at this time and Tony was chair of the training committee, which I also sat on. His role was to arrange themes for our residential weekends and these were always thought provoking. He had been attending meetings while we met at Acocks Green but as his health began to cause him problems he no longer attended our meetings, but was always still interested enough in what we were doing to phone and give his opinion of our publication The Link.

As a friend he was generous often taking both my husband and I out to lunch, especially when we celebrated our Golden Wedding. He had a wicked sense of humour which I enjoyed. May the Lord grant him eternal life and welcome him into his presence as a good and faithful servant.

The Twenty-Third World Scout Jamboree



... from 28th July to 8th August in Japan; 2015 is the 70th anniversary of the atomic bombing of cities in Japan.

As part of the peace programme, there is a one-day, off-site programme to Hiroshima which will provide opportunity for all the participants to learn from the events of 1945. Participants visit Hiroshima Peace Memorial Park including the museum. Scouts visit Hiroshima to deepen their awareness of the sanctity of life and the importance of empathizing with others. They learn about the dreadful consequences of war. Scouts are encouraged to pursue peace in the world, consider practical initiatives to further the cause of peace and share their feelings with others. They are Messengers of Peace. The harmony created by Messengers of Peace is at the heart of the Jamboree's theme "A Spirit of Unity".

Representative Scouts participate in the Hiroshima Peace Memorial Ceremony, held on the 6th August 2015. Representative Scouts also participate in the Nagasaki Peace Programme comprising a visit to the Peace Memorial Park, and participating in the Nagasaki Peace Forum with local students. There is a Messengers of Peace tent at the Jamboree Site to inspire Scouts to work towards peace. Scouts reflect on the past to explore their future vision of world peace. Participants are encouraged to think about what is necessary for peace to prevail, and make a group presentation on how their community or country is contributing to peace and what more could be done. They are being asked to interview people who have experienced war or conflict, and learn about what happened to them.
